Regionally accredited private postsecondary institutions, such as the University of Phoenix and Grand Canyon University, are exempt from assessments. The Board levies an assessment only when the fund's balance falls below \$500,000. The fund is used to compensate students who suffer financial damages as a result of an institution ceasing operations.

Funding Issue Narrative

Agency: State Board For Private Post-Secondary Education

Issue: 1 Funds Transfer - Operations to STRF (Digital Records)

Description of Issue: The Arizona State Board for Private Postsecondary Education requests the transfer of \$100,000 from the

PV2056 Operations Account to the PV3027 Student Tuition Recovery Fund. This transfer is intended to support the critical initiative of digitizing approximately 4 million documents currently stored at Iron Mountain, a

process essential for the preservation and accessibility of institutional records.

Proposal: Excess Revenue in PV2056 Operations Account:

As of the current fiscal year, the PV2056 Operations Account has generated revenue that exceeds the appropriated expenditures. This surplus presents an opportunity to allocate funds toward initiatives that align

with the Board's strategic goals without requiring additional state funding.

Both PV2056 and PV3027 accounts are funded entirely by fees collected from institutions regulated by the Board. No state general funds are involved, ensuring that the transfer aligns with the Board's operational

framework and does not impact the broader state budget. Purpose of the PV3027 Student Tuition Recovery Fund:

The PV3027 Fund is designated to protect students from financial loss in the event of an institution's closure. By transferring \$100,000 to this fund, we intend to support the broader goal of safeguarding student interests,

including the preservation of vital records.

The digitization of records will mitigate the risk of loss or damage, ensuring that student records are securely

preserved and accessible. This is particularly pertinent given recent events.

Urgency Due to Document Damage:

In June 2024, a storm caused damage to some of the documents stored at Iron Mountain. While the extent of the damage is being assessed, this incident underscores the vulnerability of physical records and the need for

immediate action to digitize and preserve these documents.

The transfer will facilitate the initiation of the digitization process, addressing both the immediate need to

protect damaged files and the long-term goal of enhancing record accessibility and security.

Alternatives Considered: Continue the current system of utilizing Iron Mountain to store paper folders (approx. 3M documents).

Costs for digitization will continue to rise each year this is delated.

Update the internal record keeping of the location of the student's educational records. 4. Require licensed institutions to maintain student records digitally to improve efficiency in retrieving student records information.

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Justification for the Digitization of Records Stored at Iron Mountain

The Arizona State Board of Private Postsecondary Education currently stores approximately 2.5 million documents at Iron Mountain, incurring an annual storage cost of \$32,000. These records are vital for regulatory compliance, historical reference, and ongoing operational needs. However, the continued reliance on physical storage is neither cost-effective nor efficient in the long term.

Cost Analysis and Long-Term Savings:

While the initial cost to digitize all 2.5 million documents is estimated to exceed \$500,000, this investment is justified by the long-term savings and operational efficiencies that will be realized. Over the next five years, the cost to continue storing these documents at Iron Mountain would amount to \$160,000. By digitizing these records, the Board would not only eliminate this recurring expense but also significantly reduce other associated costs such as retrieval fees, physical space requirements, and the potential risks of document degradation or loss.

Proposed Legislative Support:

To fund this digitization project, we propose that the legislature grant an increase in our annual appropriation by \$100,000 over the next five years. This structured approach allows for the gradual and manageable implementation of the project without overwhelming our budget in a single fiscal year.

Benefits of Digitization:

- Increased Accessibility and Efficiency: Digitized records can be accessed instantly by authorized personnel, improving response times for public records requests, audits, and internal reviews. This will streamline our operations and allow staff to focus on highervalue tasks.
- 2. **Enhanced Security and Compliance:** Digital records can be encrypted and backed up in multiple locations, reducing the risk of loss, damage, or unauthorized access. This ensures continued compliance with state and federal regulations.
- 3. **Space Optimization and Cost Reduction:** Once digitized, the need for physical storage is eliminated, freeing up resources and reducing overhead. The Board will no longer incur the \$32,000 annual storage fee, resulting in long-term cost savings.
- 4. **Environmental and Operational Sustainability:** Moving to a digital record-keeping system aligns with the state's sustainability goals by reducing paper usage and the carbon footprint associated with physical document storage and transportation.

Funding Considerations:

This project does not impact the state's general fund. The requested increase in our annual appropriation is a targeted, project-specific allocation that will ultimately result in cost savings for the state. By investing in this digitization effort now, the Board will reduce its future financial liabilities and improve operational efficiencies.

In summary, the digitization of the 2.5 million documents stored at Iron Mountain is a prudent investment in the future of the Arizona State Board of Private Postsecondary Education. It will lead to significant cost savings, improved efficiency, enhanced security, and better compliance with regulatory requirements. We respectfully request the legislature's support in increasing our annual appropriation by \$100,000 for the next five years to fund this critical initiative.

Overview:

The Arizona State Board for Private Postsecondary Education requests the transfer of \$100,000 from the PV2056 Operations Account to the PV3027 Student Tuition Recovery Fund. This transfer is intended to support the critical initiative of digitizing approximately 4 million documents currently stored at Iron Mountain, a process essential for the preservation and accessibility of institutional records.

Rationale:

1. Excess Revenue in PV2056 Operations Account:

- As of the current fiscal year, the PV2056 Operations Account has generated revenue that exceeds the appropriated expenditures. This surplus presents an opportunity to allocate funds toward initiatives that align with the Board's strategic goals without requiring additional state funding.
- Both PV2056 and PV3027 accounts are funded entirely by fees collected from institutions regulated by the Board. No state general funds are involved, ensuring that the transfer aligns with the Board's operational framework and does not impact the broader state budget.

2. Purpose of the PV3027 Student Tuition Recovery Fund:

- The PV3027 Fund is designated to protect students from financial loss in the event of an institution's closure. By transferring \$100,000 to this fund, we intend to support the broader goal of safeguarding student interests, including the preservation of vital records.
- The digitization of records will mitigate the risk of loss or damage, ensuring that student records are securely preserved and accessible. This is particularly pertinent given recent events.

3. Urgency Due to Document Damage:

- In June 2024, a storm caused damage to some of the documents stored at Iron Mountain. While the extent of the damage is being assessed, this incident underscores the vulnerability of physical records and the need for immediate action to digitize and preserve these documents.
- The transfer will facilitate the initiation of the digitization process, addressing both the immediate need to protect damaged files and the long-term goal of enhancing record accessibility and security.

4. Strategic Alignment:

The proposed transfer aligns with the Board's strategic priorities, particularly in modernizing its operations and ensuring the continued protection of student interests. Digitizing these records not only preserves them but also improves operational efficiency and compliance with state and federal record-keeping requirements.

Conclusion:

This transfer of \$100,000 from the PV2056 Operations Account to the PV3027 Student Tuition Recovery Fund is a fiscally responsible action that leverages existing resources to address an

urgent need. The digitization project will enhance the Board's ability to manage and protect critical records, benefiting both the institutions we regulate and the students we serve. We respectfully request approval of this transfer to facilitate the immediate commencement of the digitization process.

Approval of the transfer of \$100,000 from the PV2056 Operations Account to the PV3027 Student Tuition Recovery Fund.
